Conference Overview

The WinRa 2024 conference, titled "Behind the Data: Quantitative Approaches in Interdisciplinary Racism Research," is a significant gathering that aims to advance the understanding and study of racism through a particular focus on empirical and quantitative methods. The conference seeks to bridge the gap between various academic disciplines and methodologies, offering a platform for diverse perspectives and fostering meaningful dialogue on racism research.

Conference Objectives:

Interdisciplinary Collaboration: The conference aims to bring together scholars from multiple disciplines—ranging from Economics and Sociology to Education Studies, Psychology, Health Research, Geography, and Media Studies—to explore and discuss empirical approaches and methodological challenges in racism research.

Advancement of Quantitative Methods: A key objective is to introduce and expand the use of quantitative approaches, including 'big data', in the study of racism. At the same time the conference aims to open up empirical approaches to critical-theoretical scrutiny.

Knowledge Sharing and Networking: The event aims to serve as a platform for early-career scholars and established researchers to present their work, engage in intellectual exchanges, and build networks that will inform future research and anti-racism policies.

Bridging Academia and Civil Society: By incorporating members of civil society organizations and activists, the conference aims to connect academic research with action-oriented approaches and policymaking, ensuring that the research presented has real-world applications.

Target Audience

This conference is designed for:

Academics and Researchers: Scholars from various fields (e.g., Sociology, Economics, Psychology) who are engaged in racism research, particularly those utilizing quantitative or mixed methods.

Early-Career Scholars: Researchers at the beginning stages of their careers, who are encouraged to present their work and gain exposure to new methodologies and network with other scholars .

Civil Society Organizations and Activists: Individuals and organizations involved in action research and education who are looking to apply research insights to anti-racism policy and practice.

Policymakers and Practitioners: Professionals who are interested in the empirical study of racism and its implications for public policy, education, and social justice.

Conference Structure

The conference will feature a mix of curated events and open-call sessions, including:

- 1. Keynote Addresses by leading scholars in the field.
- 2. **Panel Discussions** focusing on key controversies, methodological challenges, and advances in racism research.
- 3. **Paper Presentations and Poster Sessions** that highlight latest research on topics such as racism in labour and consumer markets, health, public spaces, education, and big data.
- 4. **Networking Events**, including a walk through the Botanical Gardens and networking dinner offering opportunities for attendees to connect and collaborate.

Keynote Speakers



Prof. William A. Darity

Economist, Samuel DuBois Cook Distinguished Professor of Public Policy Duke University, USA

Title of the keynote: Stratification Economics: Identity and Inequality

The opening keynote will be given by Prof. Dr. William A. Darity (Duke University), a renowned economist recognised for his scholarly contributions to the economics of inequality and stratification. His research focuses on racial disparities, labour economics, and public policy and has been published in leading economics journals, including the American Economic Review. Professor Darity also has become a leading voice in advocating for equitable economic policies in the US. More lately, this has included spearheading the call for economic reparations for descendants of enslaved people in the United States. For this work, he has repeatedly worked with writer, folklorist, museum consultant and lecturer <u>Kirsten Mullen</u>, who will also attend the conference. The talk will be moderated by <u>Stefan Ouma</u>.

Dr. Dharmi Kapadia

Sociologist University of Manchester, UK

Title of the keynote: Surveying ethnic minority participants in the UK: Challenges to studying the effects of racism

Dr. Dharmi Kapadia is a Sociologist at the University of Manchester and is known for her research on discrimination and social inequality. Her investigations traverse domains such as race, ethnicity, gender, mental well-being, illness, sexuality, and beyond, shedding light on the complex interplay of power dynamics and societal structures that underpin discriminatory practices. She has been involved in several prominent projects and studies on inequality in the UK, such as the Evidence for Equality National Survey (EVENS) and the ESRC Centre on Dynamics of Ethnicity. The talk will be moderated by Irena Kogan.

Prof. Dr. Andreas Zick

Social Psychologist Bielefeld University, Germany

Title of the keynote: The Syndromatic Nature of Group-Focused Enmity and Right-Wing Extremism

Prof. Dr. Andreas Zick is a prominent German social psychologist known for his extensive empirical research on discrimination and intergroup relations. Prof. Zick is the scientific director of the Institute of Interdisciplinary Research on Conflict and Violence and also a leading figure in our partner network Wi-REX ("Knowledge network on right-wing extremism research"). He currently also holds the Chair of Socialization Research and Political Psychology at Bielefeld University in Germany. His research focuses on understanding the psychological processes underlying discrimination, prejudice, and intergroup conflict. Professor Zick has made key contributions to the study of "group-focused enmity", an attempt to capture attitudes in the domain of racism, extremism, discrimination and Social Darwinism into one unified concept. The talk will be moderated by <u>Aisha-Nusrat Ahmad</u>.

Local Public Transport Options:

Bayreuth is well-served by a reliable public transportation system, making it easy for conference attendees to navigate the city and its surroundings.

- **Bus Services:** Bayreuth has a well-connected bus network, with key routes running throughout the city. The most important bus routes for conference attendees are:
 - Bus #306 (Campus Express): Connects the city's central hub (ZOH)
 directly to the University of Bayreuth campus. ZOH is a 10 minutes walk from the main train station.
 - Bus #304: Another key route from ZOH to the campus.
 - Bus #316: Directly from the Bayreuth main train station to the University campus.


Purchasing Tickets: Tickets for public transportation can be easily purchased through various methods:

- Vending Machines: Available at bus stops, train stations, and major transport hubs.
- Mobile Apps: The VGN app and DB Navigator app allow for convenient mobile ticket purchases.
- **Onboard:** For bus services, tickets can also be purchased directly from the driver.

Getting to Bayreuth:

- Airports: The closest airports to Bayreuth are:
 - Nuremberg Airport (NUE): Approximately 1.5 hours by train. The most convenient option for international and domestic flights.
 - Munich Airport (MUC): Approximately 2.5 hours by train, offering a wide range of international connections.
 - From either airport, you can take a train to Bayreuth via the Deutsche Bahn (DB) service. German trains may be famous for their punctuality, we advise taking an earlier train to protect yourself against a potential delay.
- Train Services: Bayreuth is well-connected by train to major German cities. The Deutsche Bahn network provides regular services, making it easy to reach the city from places like Munich, Berlin, or Nuremberg. Tickets can be booked through the DB Navigator app, website or vending machines at the train station. Buying the ticket well ahead off time will save you significant amount of mone.

Travel Tips within Bayreuth:

- Taxis and Ride-Sharing: Taxis are readily available in Bayreuth, and can be booked via phone or hailed at taxi stands. Ride-sharing services like Uber are less common, so it's best to rely on local taxis.
- **Bike Rentals**: Bayreuth is a bike-friendly city, and there are several bike rental services available if you prefer to explore the city on two wheels.

• Walking Routes: Bayreuth is a compact and walkable city, especially around the city center. For those staying near the campus, walking to the university is also a pleasant option.

General Travel Recommendations:

- Weather: In late October, Bayreuth typically experiences cool autumn weather. Temperatures can range from 8°C to 15°C (46°F to 59°F). It's advisable to pack layers, a warm jacket, and an umbrella in case of rain.
- **Currency and Payments**: While credit and debit cards are widely accepted in Bayreuth, it's a good idea to carry some cash (Euros) for smaller establishments or public transportation.
- Language: While many people in the university area Bayreuth speak English, it's helpful to know a few basic German phrases, particularly for interacting in local shops and public transport services.
- SIM Cards: Major German airports, such as Nuremberg and Munich, have stores or kiosks where you can buy SIM cards upon arrival. However, the most economical option is to buy a pre-paid sim off a supermarket (Lidl/Aldi) or a convenience store (Rossman/dm). Popular services are Telekom, Vodafone, and O2. However if you are looking for something more economical Ortel D and Lidl SIM card are recommended. One can a monthly bundle (Internet + call minutes) for as little as 10 euro.
- Free WiFi: Bayreuth offers free public Wi-Fi (Bayern WLAN) in certain areas, such as the city center, cafes, and restaurants. The free Wifi can also be accessed on the University Campus.

To-Do List in and Around Bayreuth

Bayreuth is the regional capital of Upper Franconia, squeezed between the mid-range mountains of Franconian Switzerland and the Fichtel Mountains. The University was founded in 1975 and since has become particularly wellknown in the domain of African Studies and Ecological Research. Africarelated activities at the University of Bayreuth are coordinated by the Institute of African Studies, providing opportunities to advance studies in the humanities and social sciences and also natural sciences. Currently, it also houses the interdisciplinary "Africa Multiple" Cluster of Excellence with its emphasis on critical African Studies. In the Iwalewahaus, founded in 1981, contemporary African art is documented, researched, and taught. Interdisciplinary research and teaching are the main features of our more than 186 degree programmes offered at seven faculties in the natural sciences, food sciences, engineering, law and economics, as well as language, literature and cultural studies. The University of Bayreuth has about 12,500 students, 1,601 academic staff (274 of them professors) and 1016 non-academic employees on the campus in Bayreuth and at satellite campus in Kulmbach. This makes it one of the largest employers in the region.

Whether you're a history buff, nature lover, or just looking to relax after a day of conference sessions, Bayreuth offers a variety of attractions and activities. Here is a (non-exhaustive) list of recommendations:

1. Historical and Cultural Attractions:

 Margravial Opera House (Markgräfliches Opernhaus): The rule of the Markgrafen has left its mark on Bayreuth. Visit the Markgräfliches Opernhaus (Margravial Opera House), a UNESCO World Heritage site (which also offers guided tours in English), or the extended premises of the Eremitage located outside of Bayreuth if you are into aristocratic extravagance. More recent critical attempts to revisit this history also highlight the colonial entanglements of the Margravial era. Go on a selfguided tour with <u>Bayreuth Postkolonial</u>, if you want to learn more.

- Festspielhügel: a place of pilgrimage for those who are into composer Richards Wagner's music. Wagner's legacy is highly ambivalent. Given his antisemitism and role as an ideational inspiration for the Nazi, and his family links to "race theorist" Houston Chamberlain, who resided in Bayreuth and was married to his daughter, Wagner is not just celebrated for his music, but remains a highly controversial figure. A more recent move of the City of Bayreuth has been to develop plans to build a centre for the remembrance of National Socialism as the darkest period in more recent German history. The centre will be next to the extended green spaces of the Hofgarten in the building currently accommodating the Jean-Paul museum, the former domicile of Chamberlain.
- Iwalewahaus: is a contemporary art and culture center affiliated with the University of Bayreuth in Germany. It is dedicated to the research, documentation, and exhibition of contemporary African and Diaspora art. Check out for latest exhibitions on their <u>Facebook site</u>!
- New Palace (Neues Schloss) and Court Garden: Explore the opulent rooms of this Rococo palace, built by Margrave Friedrich of Bayreuth. The adjacent court garden offers a peaceful place to stroll and admire the landscape architecture.

2. Nature and Outdoor Activities:

- Eremitage: A beautiful park and palace complex just outside Bayreuth, featuring historic gardens, grottos, and fountains. It's a great spot for a leisurely walk or a picnic.
- Botanical Garden (Ökologisch-Botanischer Garten): Located on the University of Bayreuth campus (next to the main conference venue), this garden showcases a wide variety of plant species from different climate zones. Perfect for a relaxing break between conference sessions.
- Fichtel Mountains: For those interested in hiking or nature excursions, the Fichtelgebirge Mountains are a short drive from Bayreuth. Enjoy scenic trails, fresh air, and stunning views of the Bavarian countryside.

3. Day Trips Around Bayreuth:

- Bamberg: A UNESCO-listed town about an hour away, Bamberg is known for its medieval architecture, charming old town, and unique smoked beer (Rauchbier). Perfect for a half-day trip.
- Pottenstein: Visit the nearby city of Pottenstein, and do the hike to the "Hasenloch" and from there to the castle to have a spectacular view of the Limestone formations in the area. If you are into fish, try the smoked trouts sold at <u>Heiners Forellenräucherei</u>. If you are into rock climbing, bring you gear! The area is known as one of the best rock-climbing spots in Germany.
- Rupprechtstegen/Vorra: Have an extended hike through the stunning Pegnitz Valley. Best enter the valley from the Train Station at Neuhaus an der Pegnitz and hike down to Rupprechtstegen or Vorra. You can catch trains from there to either Bayreuth or Nuremberg.
- Kulmbach: Known as the "secret capital of beer," Kulmbach is home to a large brewery and the Bavarian Brewery Museum. The Plassenburg Castle also offers panoramic views and an interesting museum. If you are into Franconia's brewing culture, also visit Maisel's Brewery Museum in Bayreuth. You can take a tour and get to try out different local brews at the end of the tour.
- Nuremberg: is a city steeped in history and culture. Known for its medieval architecture, Nuremberg was once the unofficial capital of the Holy Roman Empire and a key site for imperial assemblies and gatherings. The city's well-preserved Old Town (Altstadt) is surrounded by ancient walls and is home to landmarks like the Nuremberg Castle (Kaiserburg), which offers panoramic views of the city. It is also famous for its role in the post-World War II Nuremberg Trials, where Nazi war criminals were brought to justice. To learn more about this, visit the Documentation Center Nazi Party Rally Grounds.
